Japanese partnership continues

In March 2004, Business Administration instructor, **John Brownlee-Baker**, paid a visit to Kushiro Public University of Economics (KPU) in Hokkaidō, Japan. He was there to represent the College in bidding farewell to a friend. KPU is a longtime partner with Capilano College and both have benefited from a faculty and student exchange for a number of years. However, the relationship really began developing in 1996 with the arrival of the university's new president, **Dr. Shigeo Aramata**. This year, Dr. Aramata retired after eight years as president, which was the reason for John's visit.

Partnership explored in Bulgaria

Capilano College is exploring an exciting new partnership opportunity with Sofia University in Bulgaria. The proposed affiliation will benefit the students and faculty of the Tourism departments at both institutions. **Dr. Nikolina Popova**, head of Sofia's Tourism department, paid an eight-day fact-finding visit to British Columbia in May. She spent time touring the North Vancouver campus with College Tourism degree coordinator, **Dr. Brian White**. "We hope to have a longstanding relationship with Capilano College," Dr. Popova said. "Your campus is beautiful and your Tourism program is exceptional. You have a lot to offer."

Friendships forged

Twenty-seven visiting French exchange students spent six weeks on the North Shore this summer learning about investment banking, venture capitalists and the downfall of the likes of **Martha Stewart**. They went rafting, camping, visited Victoria and other historic provincial sights, hiked the Grouse Grind, made lifelong friendships with their Canadian classmates, and loved every minute of it. As part of an intensive international business summer program at Capilano College, some of the students took part in a business course on current issues with financial analyst, **Ted Ohashi**.

Textile Arts exchange

Faculty and alumni of the Textile Arts program at Capilano College have been busy making an international splash with exhibits from Bowen Island to Surrey, England. Instructors **Ruth Scheuing** and **Lesley Richmond** (recently retired), along with grads

Eleanor Hannan and **Mary Bentley**, are among six talented textile artists who exhibited at the Grace Burrell Design Centre in Nutfield (Surrey), England. The show, called *Creative Link*, is part of an exchange between Canadian and British textile artists. Next year, the GBDC will bring a selection of art by some United Kingdom textile artists to British Columbia's [Foxglove Fibre Arts Studio/Gallery](#).

Dutch treat

Two business instructors from Hogeshule Zeeland University in the Netherlands stopped by Capilano College on August 31 to discuss business programs and compare teaching methods. Zeeland is a partner institution with the College's School of Business. **Dr. Ton Hulstijn** and **Dr. Ype Starreveld** met with six instructors from the business department and the dean of Business, **Catherine Vertesi**. The visitors also enjoyed a tour of the campus with two Capilano College Bachelor of Business Administration students who are involved in the student exchange program.

Study abroad

How does obtaining your master's degree in Paris sound? Or making a late afternoon visit to the Louvre, or an evening sojourn to the hidden galleries on the Left Bank before hitting the books? Capilano College and the INSEEC School of Business in France have agreed to develop a cooperative program of graduate and undergraduate education, including student and faculty exchanges. Exchanges will take place at the graduate level between the McRae Institute of International Management at Capilano College and INSEEC's MBA programs. These students will also receive a one-year paid co-op work experience overseas. At the undergraduate level exchanges will take place between Capilano's Bachelor of Business Administration degree program and INSEEC's undergraduate business programs.

B.C. premier addresses NACE

B.C. Premier Gordon Campbell was a guest speaker for Capilano College at the Fairmont Waterfront Hotel on March 3 where he addressed faculty, partners and participants gathered in Vancouver for the North American Consortium for Entrepreneurship (NACE) program. NACE is a student exchange program between Canada, the United States and Mexico that was established last year to develop young entrepreneurs and enable them to take advantage of business opportunities across the North American countries. "When we open up our cultures, we have an incredible advantage over those who don't," he told the group, which was comprised of members of Vancouver's business community, consulars, faculty and students. "Entrepreneurs with this type of experience look at the world in different ways."

Canada's best

The Canadian government has honoured two Capilano College students each with \$4,000 excellence awards from the Millennium Scholarship Foundation. **Lauren March**, a second-year Studio Art student from North Vancouver, and **David Segal**, an East Vancouver resident who is enrolled in the university transfer program, have that winning

combination of being innovative thinkers, inspiring leaders, community contributors, and exceptional students.

Success in Ottawa

“We rocked!” says the Animation department’s **Don Perro** when he and colleague **Craig Simmons** returned from Ottawa’s International Animation Festival in late September. Second-year Capilano College animation student, **Clio Chiang**, won a \$3,500 Teletoon scholarship in a category, which represented the best work across the country in public and private animation schools. A special relationship

Justin Trudeau, chair of the board of directors of Katimavik, visited Capilano College on February 3 to meet with Global Stewardship students and sign an educational agreement. The agreement between Capilano College and Katimavik, Canada’s leading national youth volunteer service program, will recognize the Katimavik program for academic credit. “Anyone who has graduated from a Katimavik program will be recognized for credit in two Global Stewardship courses at Capilano College,” says program coordinator, **Cam Sylvester**. “This new agreement will apply to students coming into the Global Stewardship program in September 2005.”

Jazz Studies grad wins new CBC jazz award

Twenty-three-year-old vocalist/pianist, **Shannon Thue**, a 2004 graduate of the Capilano College Bachelor of Jazz Studies program, is the winner of CBC Radio-Canada’s first JAM Award. CBC Radio-Canada created this new award to encourage young jazz students to follow their dreams. Named the CBC/Radio-Canada Jazz Award of Merit – or JAM – the award recognizes exceptional performance and academic achievement by a musician studying jazz at the college level.

Major win for film graduate

Chyka’s Bird, a film directed by a Capilano College alumnus and co-produced by a College instructor, took home a first place award last month at Sprockets Toronto International Film Festival for Children. Directed by **Adam Mars**, a Film Studies graduate, and co-produced by **Dave Gordon**, the production was honoured with the Famous Players Young Peoples Award for Best Short Film.

Success-filled convocation

Doreen Mary Manuel was presented with the 2004 Governor General's Academic Collegiate Bronze Medal at the June 2 convocation. Doreen graduated from the Aboriginal Film & Television Advanced Training program with a GPA of 4.23. The medal is awarded annually to the student at Capilano College who achieves the highest overall grade point average upon completion of a two-year, full-time diploma program.

For the past two years he has been volunteering at Educo Adventure School near 100 Mile House in British Columbia. “It encouraged me even more to take the GSP,” he said. “Meeting people from the other side of the world and seeing that we all have common goals was really inspiring.”

Stop your engines *please*

Over the years, there have been many myths perpetuated about basic car care. One of the more damaging to our atmosphere is the belief that shutting off and restarting a car is worse for the engine and burns more gas than idling. In reality, after 10 seconds, idling becomes more damaging to the engine, burns more gas and, in turn, burns a bigger hole in the driver’s pocket. In an effort to raise awareness about the consequences of idling engines, Capilano College held an idle free campaign on January 12. The event was geared towards informing and educating drivers about the harm an idling vehicle does to the environment, the vehicle, and to the overall environmental health of the community.

Capilano College Blues women’s head soccer coach, **Doug Abercrombie**, was inducted into the Burnaby Sports Hall of Fame on February 26 at the Burnaby Fireman’s Social Club. Coach Abercrombie has coached a host of community, college, university, provincial and Canada Games soccer teams during a 25-year career. He has led the Capilano College Lady Blues to six provincial B.C. Colleges Athletics Association titles, five national Canadian Colleges Athletics Association championships and one national

silver medal in the past seven years. He heads a soccer program at Capilano College that has produced more than 28 provincial and 15 national all-star players in that time as well.

Paperback writer

Dr. Penny Le Couteur, dean of Arts and Science at Capilano College, has had her most recent book, *Napolean's Buttons*, released in paperback. A certified management accountant since 1975, Bob instructs accounting and financial management for the Capilano College School of Business. Since 1978 the FCMA designation has been the highest honour granted by the Certified Management Accountants of Canada. FCMA's embody distinction in the qualities that CMA Canada values above all: strategic leadership, community involvement, professional

accomplishments, and an overall commitment to enriching the profession of management accounting.
