The golden touch

When she's not writing books or award-winning documentaries, **Carol Cram** actually has time to teach in the College's Executive Support and Office Management program. It's almost difficult to comprehend, given what she does in her "spare time."

Most recently, Carol applied her considerable talents to writing a documentary called *Landscape Revealed: The Art of Toni Onley*. It was the winner of a gold plaque from the Chicago Film Festival. The Chicago International Film Festival is one of the most important festivals in the industry.

"I'm also just finishing up one of the more challenging books of my career: *Communicating in Business with Technology* for Thomson Learning (Nelson Canada)," she says. "Publication is set for March 2006."

Carol's documentary, *Landscape Revealed*, depicts the life and work of **Toni Onley** (1928-2004), the internationally acclaimed Vancouver artist who died of a heart attack at the age of 75 while piloting his aircraft over the Fraser River near Vancouver.

In January, *Landscape Revealed* received a Certificate of Merit from the New York Film Festival.

"I was up against huge competition and was stunned to even find us in the finalist category," said the Motion Picture Production program grad. "In a bizarre turn of events, I now have a meeting with an agent in L.A., and a lawyer, and all kinds of other stuff."

In addition to his win down south, Chris's production also won Best International Short Film at the 2005 Edmonton International Film Festival.

"If it wasn't for my instructors I would never have survived as a production assistant or understood the movie making process as a whole," added Chris, who is now the third assistant director on the locally produced TV series, *Smallville*. "They really prepared me for what to expect in Vancouver's movie industry and I would never be doing the projects I am right now if it wasn't for them."
